

Fly of the Month – June 2019

Pat Dorsey's Top Secret Midge

Late in May, Lorie had the opportunity to fish the South Platte River on the Front Range in Eastern Colorado. Broken up into several tailwater sections, this river is legendary for large finicky trout and is home to famous guides like Landon Mayer and Pat Dorsey. While the flows were up a bit, the midge hatches were prolific to say the least. This midge pattern is simple to tie and works across a lot of different presentation styles.

Materials

 Hook: Dai-Riki #125 size 16 – 24 or your favorite wide-gap midge hook

Thread: 8/0 Brown

Body: Brown tying thread

Ribbing: 8/0 White tying threadWing: Small Pearl Diamond Braid

Head: Brown/Olive Dry Fly Dubbing

Instructions

1. Smash down barb, and secure hook in vise.

- 2. Start thread behind hook eye and advance slightly around the hook bend forming a smooth single layer underbody.
- 3. Tie in white thread for ribbing with smooth thread wraps while advancing thread to just behind the eye.
- 4. Spiral-wrap the ribbing to the head and secure with a few thread wraps. Trim the excess.
- 5. Tie in the diamond braid wing and trim to the length of the hook shank. Trim the excess.
- 6. Dub a tight, round head about ¼ the hook length.
- 7. Whip finish and trim thread.

The unweighted midge makes it fishable at any depth. You can fish it shallow under a dry midge, or deep under a larger bead head nymph or midge. According to Landon Mayer, fish in the "Dream Stream" section hate beads, so why tempt fate? He fishes a dry, dropper, dropper rig with great success, while Pat Dorsey tends to fish with a fluff indicator and single midge. This fly did produce a number of fish for us while using it as a dropper under various other nymphs.

Casting Tip – June 2019

Remember the casters mantra – no slack; be smooth.

This is important in almost all casts but especially true when making a "constant tension" cast. This is another situation where the caster does not want a tight loop. Start with a lower and slower backcast and attempt to throw a wide loop. The idea is to have the fly or flies travel "around a corner" and therefore not make a sudden change of direction. Constant tension is kept on the leader and flies. A side arm approach to the back cast can help form the rounded curve of the back cast. There is a continuous motion between the back and the forecast.

Once the forward cast is started a normal casting stoke is used but the power stop is not as abrupt or it is smoother than in a normal overhand cast. Slowly, smoothly and without any slack must be kept in mind to make a constant tension cast that will not tangle.

This cast is also known as the Belgian cast or Oval cast. This is also an excellent cast for any rig when there is a significant wind coming from behind the caster. Other tips for a multi fly or weighted set up; no or almost no false casting; use the weight of the flies to help propel the forward cast; use the water tension to slowly load the rod.

11TH Annual Stream Team Outing Details

Montauk State Park: July 12-14, 2019

Once again OFF will host an outing dedicated to promoting the Missouri Stream Team program. Stream Team staff members from the MDC and DNR will be on hand to assist.

Our Friday evening program presenter this year will be Brian Waldrop, MDC Stream Team Assistant for the Saint Louis area. Brian is very versed in the field of aquatic biology and will present a natural history of the insect family Tipuloidea (Crane Flies), this year's macroinvertebrate theme. These are the large mosquito-like insects that dance about your ceiling in the summer. If you have never seen a larval form, you will be in for quite a surprise. Fly fishers and Stream Team enthusiasts alike will find interest in Brian's program. Following Brian's presentation and in keeping with our Missouri Stream Team outing tradition on Friday evening, we will have a fly-tying class. Our instructor will demonstrate how to mimic the crane fly as a fishing fly. If you are a fly tier, please bring your fly-tying tools with you. If you are unfamiliar with fly tying but would like to give it a try, please come and enjoy the class. Fly tying tools and materials will be provided by the OFF.

On Saturday we will start the day by demonstrating volunteer water quality monitoring procedure. Learn firsthand what the biology of a stream can tell about its health. Joining Brian at our net set sampling sites will be Laura Richardson, DNR Stream Team Volunteer Water Quality Monitoring Coordinator and Dr. Barry Poulton, United States Geological Survey (USGS) Research Ecologist / Aquatic Entomologist. Regardless if you are an experienced fly caster or a novice, you may wish to work on your casting abilities with a certified casting instructor. OFF's very own Fly Fishing International (FFI) Casting Instructors Bill Armon and Master Casting Instructor Brian Ellis will be on hand to provide personal instruction. Whether you have been casting all your life or never held a fly rod in your hand, these fellows will be able to help you with your cast.

Due to continued interest, OFF member Barry Poulton will return to instruct an on stream. Tenkara (Japanese style fly fishing) demonstration. Stephen Bost, Interpretive Resource Specialist III for Montauk State Park, will present "Behind the Scenes at Montauk State Park". This promises to be a very interesting program. Stephen will reveal and discuss little known facts about the park concerning topics like invasive species removal such as foreign plants and feral hogs, water quality and stream habitat improvements, Hellbender restoration, reforestation of the Ozark Chinquapin and the restoration of the park's extensive biodiversity. These are to name a few of the subjects that he will discuss. He will allow time to answer questions following his presentation. Stephen is passionate about all things "nature" and we will look forward to this and future programs at our Stream Team outings.

Saturday evening will conclude with ice cream and fly tying. Anyone wishing to tie is welcome. Barry Poulton will be demonstrating his technique for tying Tenkara (Kebari) style flies. Don't forget our stream bank cleanup on Sunday morning in the park. Our participation with this cleanup continues to grow from year to year. OFF wants to demonstrate and promote all aspects of the Missouri Stream Team program of which stream cleanups are a major part.

<u>Anyone</u> interested is welcome to attend this outing, OFF member or not, trained or otherwise. Feel free to bring others and don't forget the kids as they will dictate the future of conservation! A complete schedule that accompanies this announcement will be sent separately.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is proposing increases to the prices of its annual trout permits and daily trout tags starting in 2020. According to MDC, the increases are needed to better cover its costs of running five trout hatcheries that raise and release more than 1.7 million trout each year for public fishing.

If the price increases are implemented, starting in 2020 the cost of an annual trout permit will go from \$7 to \$10 for anglers 16 years of age and older and from \$3.50 to \$5 for anglers ages 15 and younger. The cost of a daily trout tag to fish at Missouri's four trout parks -- Maramec Spring Park, Bennett Spring State Park, Montauk State Park, and Roaring River State Park -- will go from \$3 to \$4 for adults and from \$2 to \$3 for those 15 years of age and younger.

A trout permit is required to possess trout, except in trout parks where a daily trout fishing tag is required during the catch-and-keep season. In addition, a trout permit is required for winter fishing in trout parks during the catch-and-release season and for fishing year-round in Lake Taneycomo upstream from the U.S. Highway 65 bridge. To fish for trout, you must also have a fishing permit or qualify for an exemption.

"The Conservation Department has not increased these permit prices in nearly two decades," said MDC Director Sara Parker Pauley. "We are adjusting these permit prices -- which were set in 1999 -- to make them more in line with today's real costs of the work we do. The price increases will help MDC meet the pressures of increased management costs at our hatcheries and help meet the increased demand for trout fishing around the state."

As part of the rulemaking process, MDC is asking for public comments on the changes during July and early August at short.mdc.mo.gov/Z49. To comment on proposed price increases for trout permits, refer to "3 CSR 10-5.430 Trout Permit." For daily trout tags, refer to "3 CSR 10-5.250 Daily Hunting or Fishing Tags."

Former Vermont Community Foundation Vice President of Philanthropy to Lead Conservation and Education Organization





Berry brings over 27 years of experience within the environmental conservation field, having come to FFI from the Vermont Community Foundation where he served as vice president of philanthropy. A former commissioner of the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department, Berry is recognized as a visionary conservationist and is widely respected by his peers.

"We are very proud and excited to have found an individual of Patrick's credentials to serve FFI in this important leadership position. His management and fundraising experience — and especially his conservation philosophy — will serve FFI well as we continue to strengthen the voice of fly fishers around the world," states Tom H. Logan, chairman of the board of FFI.

Overview of the "Big Wood" Project on Mill Creek

This has been in the works for five years and is the result of much hard work by the USFS, Mark Twain National Forest Service and the Mill Creek Watershed Coalition (Kent Robinson – President, Dr Dev Niyogi – MS&T, Mark Dean - VP, Katie White, Jill Hollowell, myself and the late members Rich Pelletier and Jim Morrison). The MCWC has also been working collaboratively with Nick Girondo, fisheries biologist, at MDC who has been a long-time supporter of the team and the project. Total team effort.

<u>Objective</u>: Dramatically improve the aquatic habitat and increase the populations of aquatic species (and the biodiversity) on Mill Creek. One consequence will be a significant amount of quality holding water for trout. If anyone has come across a dead 20+" rainbow in Mill Creek in August I know you can relate.



<u>Direct project cost:</u> \$150K – Funded by MTNF Div. of USFS – (Rolla, MO).

<u>Project lead engineer:</u> Bob Gubernick – A 30+ year veteran, Bob is the leading hydrologist for the USFS (lives in Duluth). Bob has performed major stream restoration work in Alaska and the continental U.S. Bob has visited Mill Creek several times over the past 5 years and is collaborating with MTNF head hydrologist Kelly Whitsett on this project (Rolla office). Bob will finish the design work this year and implementation will begin in 2020. The NEPA study will be signed off on in September.

This is a major stream restoration project. It will begin at the picnic area bridge and proceed downstream for 500 yards. It will establish multiple, and permanent, holding water pools within a series of classic riffles, runs and pools. You may recall that from the bridge downstream, the creek is very shallow and wide. It holds very few fish and relatively little aquatic life. The Big Wood project work will involve a narrowing and significant deepening of the creek in this stretch. This work —



"bio-engineering" – will existing natural materials including black oaks that are either dead or are in the process of dying (long sections including the root wads). Bob will select the trees this fall, some of which will be from the old campground area. Large structures referred to as engineered log jams provide the backbone of the design (diagram). The wood itself lasts about 25 years. However, selective plantings behind the structures grow to anchor-in and selfperpetuate.
